#### What a Year!

Well two years, really.

Moving from Leeds was very painful in many ways. I areatly miss the closeness of friends and colleagues I made there. Moving editorial base is difficult... but Nottingham has been just great - supportive and welcoming.

Having diminished the load of the Group over time anticipating rebirth in Nottingham - the CSG has emerged from the fire twice as strong, twice as vigorous.

Our register of studies is now 10,000 in number (12,000 pdfs) and increasingly linked to already extracted data.

Our reviews number 139 and are all converted to the new RevMan format (see below).

Our publishers (Wiley-Blackwell), in 2008, noted CSG reviews to be of particularly high impact © just that there were not enough new ones 3. Well, no wonder with the changes of 2007 - but we expect 2009 to be a bumper year.

Across this same period the CSG - as a collective group has been producing its own primary research too - lots of research on searching, surveys of studies, six high-grade, real-world trials in Brazil, India, and the UK with more to come.

Thank you for all your support and help - but CSG needs more of it. We need your continued interest and enthusiasm - to help us do more, encourage new people, provide a better service and to improve the quality of our output of reviews and other research. We are [all] moving into a new phase of working with, I hope, industrial output of highest quality work but still keeping the espirit de corps that has been such an important and enjoyable part of our working together for the last 14 years.

Hi, I'm Sam(antha) - the new Trial Search Coordinator. In between running your searches, we are currently fully merging all citations in our register into studies - in 2009 our register will be fully merged - we even have a semi-automated study-finding tool.

The review author will therefore receive the full study folder which will include the new reference and references which they may have seen before. The unseen reference is

identified by looking at the references file provided on the disc to get its ID number. This way of working has been seen as valuable by our reviewers as the new reference could provide further information about a trial already documented in the review. We hope to make this yet more slick in 2009.





### 5 HINTS 4 REVMAN 5

- Risk of bias tables are best fully expanded for each included study
- When starting a new paragraph pressing Shift-Enter adds less of a gap than Enter alone
- \* You can now add a hyperlink to an outcome graph or heading in the review of your choice
- \* You can run a report on your review to pick up any problems by File>Reports>Validation Report
- \* Give it a go it won't break!

#### RevMan 5

It's all new – but not really. RevMan 5 does all you know of RevMan 4 but just looks a bit different. It is nice to use and does have added functions – such as allowing you to pick a graph and hyperlink to it in the text and the ability to save the file <u>not</u> to your computer but to a central server so that your co-reviewer or us here at the editorial base can pick up the latest version. It also has more wizzy stats and graphics. A nice feature is that there is a Risk of Bias table for each of the included studies – this is a bit of a pain to fill out for your old reviews – but does really help improve things.

All protocols and reviews already on our system have been converted into RevMan 5 format and any submitted from now on need to be in RevMan 5 in order to be published so do download a copy (<a href="http://www.cc-ims.net/RevMan/RevMan5/download/">http://www.cc-ims.net/RevMan/RevMan5/download/</a>) and give it a go.
